**PREPARING FOR YOUR VISIT**

Many of the tours, activities, and demonstrations occur outdoors at HAT sites. Everyone should dress accordingly. Inclement weather may force cancellation of some activities, and HAT sites will make every effort to offer alternative indoor activities. Ask the site for their inclement weather plan prior to your visit. Groups should be prepared for walking and standing during their visit, and we recommend that everyone wear comfortable shoes. Picnic areas and dining are available at some of the sites. You should make advance arrangements if dining at a local restaurant. Picnic areas, where available, are on a first-come, first-served basis, unless the site accepts reservations. Please check with the site for specific information about picnic and dining areas.

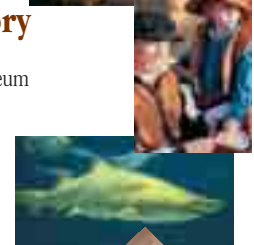
